

PARKINSON'S LAW

Sir,

I knew Parkinson. We were at Aberystwyth together and as a matter of fact we were both born in Llareggeb, in what the English newspapers would call a small Welsh mining village although no mining had been done there since the 1921 Strike. At the time about which I write, however, Parkinson's Father was, under the auspices of the Labour Exchange and its training schemes, an unemployed bricklayer in Swansea rather than an unemployed collier in Llareggeb. I mention this biographical fact because it may serve to illuminate the dark channels in which Parkinson's thoughts ran.

It was therefore with considerable surprise that I saw recently in one of our most august financial periodicals an edited or revised resuscitation of what we were bludgeoned into accepting as a truism in those penniless thirties. Parkinson's "formula" originally bore reference to the numbers on the staffs of the Labour Exchanges, against which our Celtic contumely was directed at that time: Labour Exchanges with their training schemes and re-settlement schemes, those establishments that transmuted a perfectly good collier into an execrable barber. Parkinson delivered for the first time in public his meditations on this subject at a Union debate one Friday evening in February 19... The fact that he was in no way speaking within his subject was of little importance to him or his audience: he was ripe for delivery and I must say he delivered brilliantly. He had a penchant for misquoting adaptations of famous quotations and quoting adaptations of infamous mis-quotations and I well remember his stirring peroration on this occasion:

"..... and so (and here he used a form of salutation which was quite comme il faut in those days but which I dare not write in the English language here). and so, c.m.r. des, it is an inescapable fact that if the unemployed didn't exist the Labour Exchanges would invent them".
